



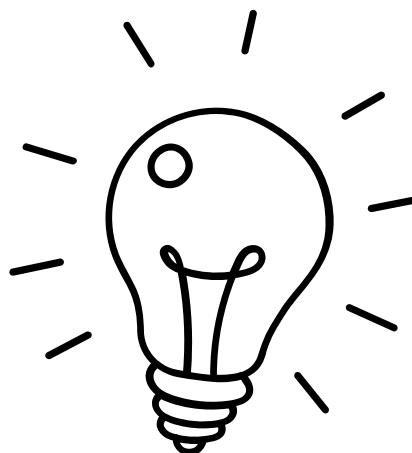

5. Encourage Student Choice in Demonstrating Learning

Let students show what they've learned in different ways. Some may prefer writing, while others might excel in presentations, group work, or creative projects like videos or posters.

6. Use Technology Thoughtfully

Leverage educational technology to provide interactive experiences. Tools like interactive whiteboards, digital apps, and language learning platforms can enhance engagement and learning.

7. Collaborate and Peer Learning

Encourage collaboration through group work or peer feedback sessions. This allows students to learn from each other and practice their communication skills in a supportive environment.

8. Create a Safe and Supportive Classroom Culture

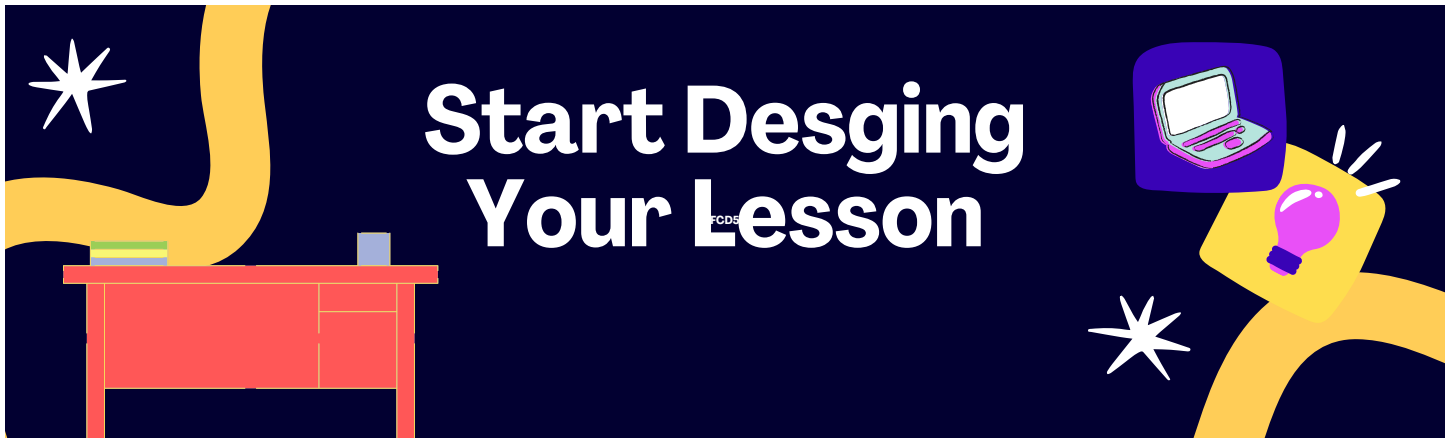
Foster a positive learning environment where students feel comfortable to take risks, make mistakes, and express themselves without fear of judgment.
